

Hunter Safety Test



During the YHEC event, the first competition for every team is the hunter safety test. The test consists of 30 different, multiple choice, questions regarding Maryland hunter safety. An ethical hunter should know all regulations when hunting to be as safe as possible. The hunter safety test is also the tiebreaker for all other events.
