## CONSERVATION

The Conservation Committee met at the Chapter Shooting Pavilion on September 19th, 2022 at 6:00pm. The order of business for the Committee was to construct 10 Bluebird nesting boxes to be hung around the Chapter grounds in February 2023 to support the local Bluebird population per recommendation from the Maryland Ornithological Society. The Conservation Committee will organize rotations for maintenance and checking the boxes for brood populations. Data collected will be shared with the Maryland Ornithological Society and the Breeding Bird Atlas Program. You can support our Chapter conservation program by joining the rotation in checking box status and reporting brood population data.



Bluebirds are favored residents of farms because they eat many insects that damage crops. By the 1950's and 1960's, the numbers of Eastern bluebirds dropped dramatically. In the early 1970's, the plight of the Eastern bluebird was recognized throughout the eastern United States and conservation programs were enacted to help restore their population.

#### Save Our Streams (S.O.S.) Program

September's water testing event took place at Big Hunting Creek in Thurmont on Monday, September 26<sup>th</sup> at 10am. The site is near the bridge, Route 77 about 2 miles West of US 15 at the Headquarters Building on the North side of the road. Some notable testing results at Big Hunting Creek we are tracking are chloride levels have steadily decreased from 1.4 to 0.2 mg/L which we are very happy about. Also, the pH levels have risen from acidic 5 to a neutral 7. These are great numbers for the Creek, however, nitrate levels have risen from 0 to 1 mg/L. All numbers reported on are within acceptable levels, but we are keeping an eye on the data trend and will keep you posted. Testing in October will be conducted in Thurmont at Big Hunting Creek, and back at Catoctin Creek Nature Center in November. After November, we will resume testing in March along with macro-invertebrate monitoring. Equipment and permits are being staffed for the spring event. Invertebrate monitoring will occur twice a year, initially, and increase with greater participation support.

IWLA Frederick Chapter #1 Save our Streams program provides testing and long-term water chemistry data on select streams in Frederick County Maryland. Future goals include continued stream monitoring for chemical contaminants, introduction of Salt Watch in the winter, and macro-invertebrate monitoring. The Izaak Walton League's Save Our Streams program is the only nationwide program training volunteers to protect waterways from pollution and bring information about water quality to their communities.

Currently, we plan to begin Salt Watch during the winter to determine the impact of road salt changing the salinity of our streams. Plan to help the IWLA in this vital work supporting the League's strategic goal "To conserve, restore, and promote the sustainable use and enjoyment of our natural resources, including soil, air, woods, waters, and wildlife."

#### Pollination Program

Nigel Wood, Boy Scout in Troop 796 Ijamsville MD, completed his conservation science project by planting two pollinator gardens on the Chapter grounds. Mike Morgan provided invaluable assistance by tilling the soil in both plots prior to planting. Part of Nigel's science project was determining the optimal process for cold stratification of Swamp Milkweed seeds. Swamp Milkweed seeds need to endure winter weather before they will germinate in the Spring; this is called cold stratification. Nigel determined that the cold stratification process can be sped up by refrigerating Swamp Milkweed seeds in moist soil for only one month yielding a 40% germination rate compared to the 30% germination rate in the wild. Nigel planted the Swamp Milkweed plants grown from his science experiment as a donation to the Conservation Committee's pollinator gardens.

The pollinator gardens will support our Mason Bee habitat program providing pollen as food for the Mason bees. Also, the Swamp Milkweed plants will provide breeding habitat for Monarch butterflies which are declining in population. Monarch butterflies prefer to lay eggs on Swamp Milkweed plants

which provides food for their larva. Our intention is to develop a robust garden of milkweed plants and eventually have butterfly chrysalises that will bolster the Monarch population and can serve as instructional tools for students. Our Mason Bee program made it into the <u>September Maryland IWLA</u> <u>Newsletter</u> that you can see on page 3.
