New Housing Development Being Built On Contaminated Soil Near Fort Detrick

A new housing development is going up near <u>Fort Detrick</u>, Maryland, and the <u>Army</u> is considering a series of engineering efforts to protect the homeowners after it contaminated adjacent land throughout much of the 20th century by testing biological weapons.

Many of the homes next to what is known as the Area B section of the base (north of Montevue Ln and west of Rosemont Ave) are already built -- some of them for sale -- and single-family properties are selling for about \$640,000, which is roughly the median price for the area. One of the nearby developments is Waverly View. That nearby 399-acre section of Fort Detrick was once a proving ground for the Army's biological warfare program and used as a disposal site for chemical,

medical, and radiological waste, according to the Environmental Protection Agency.

Decades the Armv ago, was frequently testing biological weapons on the outskirts of the Washington, D.C., area, and those grounds are still heavily contaminated. Fort Detrick as the center of the served Pentagon's bio-weapon development, until those weapons were outlawed by President Richard Nixon.

Army Installation Management Command said in a statement that the main environmental concern for the new housing development is trichloroethylene. That chemical

compound was also a main pollutant of water at Camp Lejeune in North Carolina for decades, and prolonged exposure can cause kidney cancer among other health complications, <u>according to the National Cancer Institute</u>.

Trichloroethene and tetrachloroethene, two volatile organic compounds, have also been major chemical constituents found during groundwater testing, according to the EPA.

The contamination can potentially impact dozens of new residential real-estate developments in the area, based on internal documentation from the Army Corps of Engineers. Army officials canceled a scheduled Military.com interview with Fort Detrick's environmental official.

Our monthly Conservation Committee meetings are normally held the first Monday of the month; all Chapter members are welcome to attend. Conservation Trail Maintenance

On June 19, 2024, Frederick #1 Chapter Ikes Mark Davies and Preston Wood took about an hour to clear a section of the Conservation Trail from trees that fell over the path near the kennels on the part of the trail that starts to descend toward the railroad tracks. The Conservation Trail is a mile long trail that travels mostly along the

Among the fallen logs was a walnut tree that would be valuable for wood working purposes if a member would like to get it. It's on the side of the trail.

Mark and Preston also started the process of injecting herbicide into one of the large invasive Ailanthus (Tree of Heaven) trees on the Chapter property near the property entrance beside the pond. Once dead, this tree will be removed along with other invasive tree and plant species in our forest per our Forest Stewardship Plan from the Department of Natural Resources.

The 2024 Save Our Streams (SOS) season has resumed at Ballenger Creek Park and at Tuscarora Creek near the C&O Canal occurring each month from March to November. The SOS Team is in the process of applying for an 18-month federal permit to conduct chemical tests in Monocacy Battlefield National Park's Bush Creek. This is the same creek running just across the road at the Frederick Chapter. Bush Creek receives runoff from the Frederick County Landfill.

Thanks to the addition of several interested stream monitors, the chapter Save Our Streams program is forming two separate teams for testing. While there is presently no increase in the number streams tested, we have now additional flexibility in planning for future Save Our Streams events. Chris Barrett is well on his way to becoming certified for macroinvertebrate monitoring and will be our second team leader.

Chemical stream testing occurred on Saturday, June 29th at Tuscarora Creek. Chemical



test revealed the following data:

Most tests showed improvement over our May tests revealing progress in pH, chloride, and nitrate levels, while phosphate and transparency scores dropped. A notable result was the large drop in dissolved Oxygen plummeting from 98% to 68%. While the current dissolved oxygen level is still considered "fair", this will cause a significant impact on the creek's ability to support stream wildlife. We will keep an eye on this metric for our next test.

Next stream testing day is Saturday July 27th at Balenger Creek, 10:00am. Park in the Ballenger Creek Park's Dog Park parking lot.

IWLA Frederick Chapter #1 Save our Streams program provides testing and long-term water chemistry data on select streams in Frederick County Maryland. The remaining Save Our Streams testing dates for 2024:

Pistol Range Refurbishment

Installed on the backstop are red lines that are placed directly over the vertical supports holding up the frame. The top and bottom of the red lines indicate where the top & bottom horizontal supports are.

Per our Chief Range Safety Officer, Ben Kelkye:

- 1. Do not shoot the red lines.
- 2. Keep all shots landing between the red lines in front of your pistol stall.
- 3. Do not cross shoot into other target areas.
- 4. Attach targets inside the red lines to prevent destroying the supports with bullet impacts

41 Miles on the Monocacy River in a Kayak

On June 5, 2024, fellow club member and good friend John Gallo and I completed our goal to kayak and fish the 41-mile Monocacy River Scenic Water Trail running through Frederick County. What started as just a day trip to fish a section of the river turned into a desire and commitment to float and fish the entire 41 miles of the Monocacy from Route 77 to the Potomac. This is our story:

John has 2 fishing kayaks and had been trying to persuade me to get in one and fish a

section of the Monocacy River. I had no experience at all in a kayak and so, I was a little hesitant to jump right in and it took some persuading before I said "let's do it". We decided to fish a section from Route 77 to the Legore Bridge. We parked a truck at the take-out location at Legore Bridge and drove the second pickup with the kayaks to the put in location at Route 77. We got an early start arriving just after sunrise and it looked to be a perfect day for fishing with slightly overcast sky and not too hot.

I got to admit that I was a little nervous as I put on the life jacket and climbed into, or rather fell into, the kayak (at 68, getting in and out of a sit in kayak can be a little challenging) but, with John's coaching it really wasn't that bad. Once in I pushed back from the bank and floated out into the river. John gave me some basic tips on how to paddle, turn, slow down and stop the kayak. He also reassured me that the kayak was very stable, and I would really have to work hard to flip it. After some practice we headed down stream on a 3.25mile float.

It didn't take long before John caught the first fish, a nice sized catfish and soon after I caught a small mouth bass. We caught a lot of fish on that float (20+) and it didn't take long before I was hooked on kayak fishing and the Monocacy. John talked about the 41-mile Monocacy River Scenic Water Trail and the more we talked about the river the more we became interested in float fishing the entire 41 miles and eventually set a goal to do just that.

The scenic beauty of the river is amazing, and it is easy to forget about the developments, roads, and farms just a short distance away and to imagine Native Indians, frontiersmen and early settlers

water in canoes. Wildlife is abundant along the river and during the 41-miles we saw Bald Eagles, Blue Heron, geese, several species of ducks, deer, muskrats, snakes, turtles and all types of birds. We caught tons of fish, mostly small mouth bass but also some largemouth bass, catfish, redbreast sunfish, rock bass, blue grill, redear sunfish. And although we didn't catch one, we saw huge carp swimming under our kayaks. All the fish we caught we released.

We divided the river into manageable sections which were about a 3–5 mile distance and averaged about 4-6 hours to fish and float. We used the Monocacy River Scenic Water Trail as a guide but didn't necessarily follow it exactly. River access points and parking availability was the

deciding factor that determined the length of a particular section. We divided the river into 8 separate sections and fished the river at our leisure with no time frame set to complete our goal. Hunting season, family commitments and water level conditions all affected time spent on the river. It took us about a year and a half to complete all the sections.

Our last section to kayak was from the Route 355 bridge to the Park Mills Road bridge. We saved this section until last because of having to navigate the ruins of the Buckeystown Dam and the Greenfield Rapids. We were just a little apprehensive about what to expect and unsure of our ability to tackle these two spots. I can tell you we did more than one recon mission to these locations to explore our options from the safety of the riverbank as well as using google earth satellite images.

On June 5, 2024, we decided to go for it and invited our good friends Mike Moneypenny and Dan Neuland to join us. Mike is a fellow club member and Dan is the Western Region Coordinator for Maryland's Hunter Safety Education Program and a well-known writer The Frederick News Post for Outdoor column. They were eager to join us and so we developed a plan and decided to meet around 7am at the Route 355 bridge.

John and I were in our kayaks and Dan and Mike were using Dan's

two-person inflatable pontoon boat. This section turned out to be our longest float at around 10 miles and around 9 hours to complete, much longer than we anticipated. In hindsight breaking this float into two sections would have been more comfortable but we managed it with no problems.

About 5 miles into the float, we finally reach the ruins of the Buckeystown Dam. Dan and Mike led the way and picked the line while John and I stayed back and observed. Dan's

inflatable glided over the rapids with ease. Dan is not your average river runner, he has considerable experience in river fishing, in canoes, kayaks and his inflatable pontoon fishing machine so he has a keen eye for reading the water and picking a line to travel safely over the rapids. Next was John's turn and then me. I will admit that it was a tense moment but we both shot through the rapids with no problem and crossing the ruins of the dam wasn't as bad as some of the other areas encountered.

For me the Green Field Rapids were probably the worse not because of any problems getting through but the water splashing over the bow made for a wet ride. We finished our 41-mile trip by floating the last 2 miles in a heavy down pour and got soaking wet. But it was a hot day and the rain felt refreshing and a welcome relief from the heat. We

completed the 41 miles without a flip although there were some tense moments when a swim felt imminent but we managed to avoid it. At its deepest the water was maybe 5-8 feet and John's famous saying, "if you flip just stand up and walk to the bank"!

Kayak fishing the 41 miles on the Monocacy was a great experience. Floating in a Kayak gets you up close and personal with the river and the wildlife it supports. You gain a greater appreciation for its unique beauty and the importance of keeping it wild and protected for future generations to enjoy. It was sad to see trash in a few places left by some who fished from the bank and knowing that it was just as easy for them to carry it out as it was to carry it in left me wondering why!

I owe a big thank you to John Gallo for talking me into getting on the river and for his guidance on kayaking and how to read the water. If you decide to kayak the 41-miles or for that matter any section of the river, I give you these tips; go with a friend and preferably someone with river kayaking experience, always wear your life jacket, learn to read the water, respect the power of the river, remember the river flow never stops, and anything floating in it is flowing with it!


